



Remembrance Sunday - 2018

After the Remembrance Service in Kingston on Sunday 11 November 2018 the Royal British Legion members met for lunch at the Journey's End. I was going to tell a story at the lunch. Unfortunately I wasn't very well and didn't attend. In the hope you may find this story interesting – here goes.

The Royal British Legion (RBL) set themselves the task of ensuring all the service men and women who lost their lives in the First World War should be remembered in the four years between 2014 and 2018. This was a mammoth task and it involved contacting relatives, friends, branches, associations and regiments. I had a letter from the RBL asking me to remember Richard Eddy. I had no idea who he was, he wasn't a member of my immediate family, but I feel that all people whose surname is Eddy can trace their ancestry back to Cornwall. My second daughter – Vivien – did some research on the problem and she found Richard Eddy's mother was my grandfather's first cousin. Our grandfather was seven in a family of ten so that left a bit of scope. They had been born to the family in the Hale area of Cornwall and as a young man my grandfather moved to Wadebridge. He in turn had a family of seven so there were a lot of people to look for. Further research by Vivien showed that Richard Eddy had been in the same regiment as my father and his older brother Raymond - 2nd Devon Yeomanry. The regiment had been in France and was withdrawn in 1916 to Palestine following the failure of Gallipoli.

I know my Father and Uncle Raymond were in Palestine as at a family lunch in the early 30's Uncle Ray asked my father if he remembered the rice pudding at Gaza. The cook had got some goats milk and she made rice pudding for the company and half of them were sick because it was so rich. They went on to talk of 'Mespot'.

General Allenby was appointed to this Middle Eastern adventure and built up his troops around the Gaza area. His first task was to send the Task Force down to the Suez Canal to drive the Turks away to control the Canal so reinforcements, supplies, etc. could get through to the Mediterranean. The Task Force drove out the Turks but there were a number of casualties on our side and Richard Eddy, sadly, was one of these. Vivien had found out that he was buried at El Qantara in Egypt. Allenby having driven the Turks back, we know he moved East to the mountains and cleared the Turks out of Jerusalem and down to the Dead Sea. Allenby had to build a bridge across the River Jordan in order to go on. They were heading for what we know now as Iraq – Mesopotamia – no wonder the Army called it 'Mespot'.

Fast forward nearly 30 years. I had completed my pilot training, was flown to the Middle East to a reception area near Cairo. I was there for a couple of weeks then put on a train to Jerusalem - an 18 hour rail journey. A couple of hours after we left Cairo we arrived at the Suez Canal and crossed it by swing bridge at a place called El Qantara. We stopped briefly where I saw an Arab village, all brown, hundreds of miles of desert, all brown and a little piece of green at the end of the village

The train journey went on and the first place we stopped over the Palestine border was Gaza. On to another reception centre where I gathered a crew me as pilot, an engineer, navigator, bomb aimer, signaller and three air gunners. We are then sent back down to the plane in an airfield called Aqir where we learnt to fly a Wellington Bomber.

Having finished our course we went back down on the train again, heading back to the Canal Zone and through Gaza down the same old line, past El Qantara and that little patch of green was still there. We went on further and got off just beyond Ishmailia and went to an airfield called Abu Suir.

Over the years I have visited a number of the Commonwealth War Graves in the Esast. Mostly small, they are all wonderfully cared for and I realized the patch of green I had been looking at in Al Qantara was probably the place Richard Eddy was buried. It's a difficult place to get to but thousands and thousands of travellers who have gone through the Suez Canal slowly over the years had a view of this little cemetery. I only hope they realized what they were looking at and had time to think about it.


This was all encapsulated in Rupert Brook's poem ' The Soldier' "If I should die, say only this of me, that there's

a corner of a foreign field that is forever England."

In conclusion I can say that following the request by the Royal British Legion

Cousin Richard – you are remembered.



After all the planning and organising for the South West Outdoor Festival back in October I am pleased to say that it all went well with hundreds of people joining us. Even with the inclement weather on the Saturday everyone who came had a great enjoyable time. We now hand the SWOF torch over to the Cornwall team who will be hosting the festival on 13th – 15th September 2019 at Penrose between Helston and Porthleven.

After the recent storms we have had some lumps of congealed palm oil washed up onto Wembury beach and could be washing up onto other beaches in the area. It is toxic to animals if eaten and so we advise that you keep dogs on a lead to prevent them from coming into contact with it. If you do find any on the beach if possible please move it to any area where it is not easily reached by animals and we will endeavour to collect it. I would also like to thank everyone who has come down to the beach and collected a bit of litter each day ensuring the beach is kept safe and clean for everyone.

During the next few months we will be doing some swaling (burning areas of vegetation) alongside scrub clearance at Noss and stoke cliffs. It can look dramatic, but is vital for the restoration of these coastal grasslands. Gorse and thorn can quickly smother areas limiting the diversity and wildlife richness and swaling is a way to remove large patches, allowing the species rich grasslands to regenerate. We select certain areas to swale so we ensure that a mosaic of young dense scrub patches are kept, which provides shelter and nesting for the plentiful bird life. Grazing is then needed to help control the re-growth of scrub. Cattle and sheep are vital in helping us manage the coastal grassland; ensuring the area is accessible for all to enjoy and remain rich in wildlife.

Finally I hope you all have a wonderful Christmas and a very happy and healthy New year.






