Welcome to the February issue of the newsletter. This month I have received the following communication from Adrian regarding the trees in the village. I think Adrian has raised an important issue for us all so have included this correspondence here.

"In the 11 years we have lived in Ringmore, quite a few mature trees in the village have disappeared, at the rate of at least one a year, but with very few replacements having been planted, as far as I am aware. Of course we are not always aware of new plantings until they become large enough to be noticeable, which can take decades. In addition, trees are not always planted deliberately. We get self-sown seedling trees in our garden from time to time and sometimes we leave them to grow a bit before deciding whether or not to leave them where they are.

Jane Guy was a tree warden when we first arrived in the village, but nobody took over this role when she moved away. I wonder whether it might be a good idea to try to find another tree warden, as a focal point for discussion as to how we might best preserve and sustain the iconic trees which are such a feature of the village.

Within the conservation area, SHDC permission is required before removing full-grown trees and there are have been a number of applications in recent years. Presumably the Parish Council is notified of these, although I don't recollect any being minuted, but it might be nice if a member of the council would monitor the felling of trees within the village and be the person to whom we could direct any

suggestions we have as to whether, and if so how, such trees might be replaced.

If you have any thoughts as to how we might best try to sustain our iconic trees for future generations, then it would be good to hear from you.

I'm aware that there was a Free Tree programme in in the not-too-distant past when Mike and Alison planted a number of trees on their land, including a conker tree. I am told that a Millenium Wood was planted (at Houghton?) and at least one Millenium tree was planted, all within the last couple of decades, but if you know more about these or other significant trees which have been planted, even if they are not yet large enough to be visible, please do let us know.

I'm also aware that several species of trees in this country are under threat from different diseases, which makes it all the more important to keep a variety of trees, rather than just relying on sycamores everywhere. What ideas or suggestions have you got?"

I plan to raise this matter for discussion at the next Parish Council meeting and hope this is something we can get back onto the village agenda.

## Rural Dean's Reflections ..... Reverend Jackie Taylor

As the ancient steps made their way down the side of Mount Zion to the Kidron Valley, we looked on the very stones that Jesus probably walked on as he made his way with his disciples to the Mount of Olives and the Garden of Gethsemane. On a wall at the top of the steps, a frieze

depicts their decent down them - and nearby another scene - Jesus being dragged up the same stone flight after his arrest - to the house of the High



Priest.

Even stones told stories in their silent witness as words in the Bible came alive in unexpected ways for those of us who were blessed with this time on pilgrimage in the Holy Land. It was a year ago this month when we began the season of Lent together in the lands where Jesus walked.

This year we step into the season of Lent on 14th

February – Ash Wednesday – which happens to be on the same date as Valentine's Day. Days that resonate with people for different reasons - one Christian, one secular, yet each with love at the very centre of them. On Valentine's Day, we

celebrate the love we share in those special relationships in our lives. Ash Wednesday and Lent point us to the greatest act of love of all time. We accompany Jesus on a journey that will lead him to the Cross. A journey that is grounded in reality that acknowledges the worst in humanity, its mess, its violence, selfish ambition, power and yet also how it can be, demonstrated in the beauty, peace, truth and love that we see in Jesus. The love that took him - God's own Son - to the Cross, so that through him we might have life and receive the joy of Easter.

Whether you choose to celebrate Lent, Ash Wednesday, Valentine's Day or all three, I hope that we can all celebrate the gift of love. We can remember

and give thanks to God for the greatest gift of love in his Son, Jesus Christ, to whom even the stones of the Holy Land tell stories in their silent witness. How much more can we?


## Prayer Chain

How does your garden grow? That was the title for our January meeting, when we welcomed Nick Allison, the Head Gardener at Saltram House. He illustrated his presentation with some very interesting photos of the work that is being done there.

Nick explained how and when to take cuttings of delphiniums and lupins. Would anyone have thought that with both these plants you take a shoot out of the centre of the parent plant, put it in a mixture pf compost and grit – and wait? Nick Allison has a real love for the garden at Saltram House, and this came across in the details he went into when showing not only newly planted areas, but also herbaceous borders in their summer glory. He outlined how to take cuttings of roses by layering branches in the soil, leaving them through the winter, and then gently investigating in the spring to see if roots have grown.

Several visitors came to the meeting, and everyone went away having learnt some interesting tips and information.

Our February meeting has the provocative title "My Life in Prison"!





Swallows in January? On Thursday 25th January around mid-day I was walking Daisy along the top of the fields which lead from the cliffs west of Ayrmer cove to the top of the wood. It was sunny, but quite a strong south-westerly wind made it a bit chilly. Imagine my amazement when I saw and heard a group of 5 or 6 swallows flying across the field, heading up towards Ringmore. Half way across the field, they turned and flew into the wind for a moment before bearing away again and heading diagonally up towards the village once more.

If I had only seen them, but not heard then, I should have concluded that I must have been mistaken, but we all know so well the sight and sound of swallows in the village that I am quite certain they were swallows, that is until I mentioned this to a friend who lives in East Allington and then I began to wonder. Each year they have house martins nesting under their porch and just this week they have found the annual signs of bird poo on their post box below the nest. They haven't seen the birds yet, but they say there is no mistaking house martin poo when you live with it all summer. This was no sparrow or robin poo.

So did I see house martins or swallows? Just minutes later there were some linnets or wheatears flying across the same field and I would never claim to be able to identify them at almost 50 yards, but I really do think I saw swallows before the end of January. This is statistically so improbable; mid March is regarded as pretty early. So has anyone else seen swallows yet?

## It's a scam - please talk to vulnerable relatives and friends about this

Police would like to warn the public in the South West about a phone scam that is conning vulnerable and elderly people out of thousands of pounds.

The scammers prey on victims by cold calling them and impersonating an HMRC member of staff. They tell them that they owe large amounts of tax which they can only pay off through digital vouchers and gift cards, including those used for Apple's iTunes Store. Recent calls to residents in the Torbay and Teignmouth areas apparently originate from a Manchester area code (01618).

Victims are told to go to a local shop, buy these vouchers and then read out the redemption code to the scammer who has kept them on the phone the whole time. The conmen then sell on the codes or purchase high-value products, all at the victim's expense.

The scammers frequently use intimidation to get what they want, threatening to seize the victim's property or involve the police. One caller stated that if the victim hung up then the amount payable would go up to £90,000.

HMRC would never request the settling of debt through such a method.

## What can you do:

- Share this information and TALK to potential victims who are not on social media.
- If you suspect that you or a vulnerable or elderly relative has been the victim of this scam or a similar one, report it immediately to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040 or use their online fraud reporting tool.
- Check GOV.UK for information on how to avoid and report scams and how to recognise genuine HMRC.
- If you think you have received an HMRC related phishing/bogus email or text message do not respond but report to Action Fraud.
- 5. Apple provides a support page reminding customers that iTunes Gift Cards can be used ONLY to purchase goods and services on the iTunes Store, App Store, iBooks Store, or for

an Apple Music membership, and providing tips to avoid becoming the victim of a scam.

## Fake bank notes in area.

Police have received a report of a fake £50 note being passed at the Beefeater along Belgrave Road in Torquay on Thursday 18 January. Officers would like you to ensure all staff know what to do if they suspect a banknote is counterfeit. The Bank of England offers advice for retailers and businesses <u>on its website</u>.

If you come across a counterfeit banknote, it is important that the police are contacted in all instances. Please contact police via 101@dc.police.uk or by calling 101.

This message refers to crime reference number CR/005361/18.

## **Defibrillator Training.**

I am keen to arrange a training event for the Parish of Ringmore and Bigbury. I recently attended a training event at Bigbury and found it extremely interesting and very useful. CPR and use of a defibrillator can save lives without a shadow of a doubt. I am aware that the last event clashed with a different event and given the above I have provisionally arranged for the First Response unit from South West Ambulance Service to visit Ringmore.

This will allow for those of us who either could not make the previous session or those of us whom are sensible enough to realise the value of training and refresher training. I do not wish to waste the time of the local paramedic who has kindly agreed to attend and provide us FREE training. Provided there are sufficient numbers and interest I will confirm a time and date but perhaps you would kindly contact me by email or phone to confirm your interest.

Where you are a couple I strongly urge you to both attend. It could well be the difference between saving your partner as time is crucial should you experience such an event.

Those valuable minutes are vital. Do you even know where the nearest defibrillator is? Do you know how to do CPR?

I have included a recent news extract below by way of example.

## PLEASE ATTEND AND CONTACT ME TO CONFIRM YOUR INTENT.

Victim lives to meet his new granddaughter thanks to two life-saving officers. A proud grandfather has had the honour of his first cuddle with his baby Grandaughter after two officers from Merton saved his life after he collapsed in the street.

On Friday 24th November, PC's Phillippa Knight and Gemma Dobson took a call from the London Ambulance Service asking to assist a man who had collapsed on Salcombe Road, Morden. Both officers immediately rushed to the scene to find Ray Willoughby, 59, unresponsive on the floor.

PC Knight instantly started performing CPR whilst PC Dobson prepared the transportable defibrillator, a new piece of equipment that The Met has been rolling out across the force.

On the third attempt, the victim regained consciousness temporarily. He then stopped breathing again and lost consciousness as an ambulance arrived on the scene.

The paramedics said it was one of the most complicated cardiac arrests they had ever seen.

Mr Willoughby's daughter, said: "We were told by the paramedics who assisted that police cars have only recently started carrying defibrillators. Without this equipment, his life would not have been saved. I know it was the first time either police officer has had to use the defibrillator and under the circumstances they did an outstanding job.

"Without the help of these two officers using the defibrillator, my dad would definitely not be here, which to me is a huge thing as he mean the absolute world to me.

"Without doing what they did, my dad wouldn't have got the chance to meet this granddaughter."

Keen to find out how he was getting on, both officers visited Mr Willoughby the next day in hospital, before their shift.

Officers Knight and Dobson, added: "We are over the moon that our new piece of equipment saved Ray's life and enable him to spend Christmas with his family and meet his new granddaughter. We did what any member of the police family would have done."





## 2/18 MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING IT WAS RESOLVED THAT the minutes of the meeting held on 11 November 2017 were accepted as a correct record

Resolution carried unanimously. The minutes were signed by the Chairman.

## 3/18 AIR AMBULANCE NIGHT LANDING SITE

Toby Russell of the DAAT addressed the meeting and confirmed that a suitable site had been identified with the agreement of the landowner and tenant farmer. The route of the necessary fencing had been agreed. Quotes were awaited for the electrical work and lighting pole. Western Power had a nearby electrical supply. Within four to five weeks all the costs should have been assessed.

RG offered £2,000 from the Devon Locality Fund in April 2018. The Clerk had made an application for funding to SHDC's Town and Parish Fund.

Cheques totalling £728.20 were given to the Clerk to bank towards the Night Landing Site project, this the total raised to date stood at £3,322.

## 5/18 PRECEPT 2018-19

The meeting discussed the draft precept proposal prepared by the clerk. It was noted that there were increasing demands on parish councils to take over work previously carried out by South Hams District Council and Devon County Council. Also, Ringmore Parish Council had run a deficit for several years and the deficit caused by excess of expenditure over income had been met from reserves. At the same time it was recognized that there was pressure from parishioners for Council Tax not to be increased significantly. With this in mind the meeting looked at all items of projected expenditure and noted that the single biggest outlay each year was the cost of the refuse skip in April and October. Thus it was decided in 2018 to offer only a skip in April and dispense with the October service. With this adjustment the precept could be set at £5,250 (2017-18: £5,166) and this would result in a year on year increase in Council Tax for Band D homes to £42.47 (2017-18 £41.42) being 3. 09%. The percentage increase was in part due to there being two fewer homes in the parish registered under Band D (123 houses in 2018-19, 125 in 2017-18).

**IT WAS RESOLVED THAT** the precept demand for 2018-19 be set at £5,250 and the Clerk be instructed to complete the necessary form and file it with SHDC. Resolution **carried unanimously**.


