OUR NEW VICAR WRITES ...

The New Year can often bring many changes. As the new vicar of Modbuy mission community this New Year has brought a new house, a new job, new churches, new school and a new born baby! We have moved from central Exeter to Modbury. The area of South Hams is not completely new to us as a family. My grandfather ran a market garden just outside of Plymouth in Elburton and so growing up I had many summer holidays on the beaches of Bigbury and Bantham.

However, I am not alone in experiencing change. As we look out to 2018 there are bound to be changes locally, nationally and internationally. It has been said that there is nothing permanent except change. You just need to look at how the cost of your shopping bag has increased over the years to see that. Back in 1980 a Mars bar would set you back 15p and today you would pay around 60p, but what makes it even more galling is that research shows Mars Bars have shrunk 28% since 1990. While a Mars bar might have set you back 15p in 1980 the average price of a house was £39,500. Good news for those who brought a house in 1980! Yet it's not just Mars bars and houses that change in price and size, all of us can be caught up in changes which are outside of our control and can be unsettling.

In times like this I have found wonderful comfort is knowing the unchanging Lord Jesus. One of the New Testament writers describes him like this: 'Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and for ever.'

As I look ahead to the rest of 2018 I am looking forward to being part of the local communities that the Churches of the Modbury mission community serve. I am looking forward to helping people of all ages and backgrounds discover and follow the unchanging Lord Jesus Christ.

It was with great sadness to announce that Alice, aged 102, passed away following a short illness. Alice became ill just before Christmas and was taken to hospital on Christmas Day, passing away on the morning of 29th December 2017. Alice was born on the 12th November 1915 in Well Cottage, which was owned by one of her uncles. She went to school in the village and at her own admission was often told off for laughing and talking too much. She then went on to Modbury School where she learnt the piano and joined the choir at age 10, leaving school at age 14. Alice started playing the All Hallows Church Organ in 1942 and played for the next 60 years. Our thoughts and prayers are with Alice`s family at this sad time



The Citizens Advice service helps people to resolve their problems, providing free, confidential, independent and impartial advice to everyone, informing them of their rights and responsibilities. The goal is to help everyone find a way forward with whatever problem they face. As an organisation it values diversity, promotes equality and challenges discrimination.

The issues that people have cover debt, housing, homelessness, disabilities, benefits, employment, consumer problems and more. Last year in the South Hams alone the charity helped over 4,300 residents resolve over 9,040 problems.

Citizens Advice watches for unfairness amongst the issues that clients present with and campaigns for change, influencing local and national policymakers and service providers. It is a major champion for citizens and consumer rights.

It is also staffed mainly by trained volunteers and relies on donations and funding to survive.

The local charity needs people to come forward as volunteers, as advisers, as administrators, as fundraisers and to help with PR. The type and length of training provided will depend on what role interests you. People from all walks of life volunteer, those who have retired, those who want to return to work and need current work experience, young people wanting to add work experience to their CV's and those who are looking for their next direction in life.

Alice Mason

1915 - 2017



Alice was born on the 12th November 1915 in Well Cottage, which was owned by one of her uncles. She went to school in the village and, at her own admission, was often told off for laughing and talking too much. She then went on to Modbury School where she learnt to play the piano and joined the choir at age 10; she left the school at age 14. Alice's uncle and father, after selling Well Cottage, bought a plot of land and built the two bungalows – Elmsleigh and Greenways (often known as Timber town), but initially the family lived in the cottage next to the Journey's End. She worked in Bigbury-on-Sea Post Office, but came home to look after her granny.

When Reverend Dade came to All Hallows she joined the church choir and also occasionally, played the organ. She carried on teaching the piano, but her real love was playing the organ. Her father was the village undertaker and Alice helped with laying-out and lining coffins. She met her husband following one of her father's sing song get togethers over the dead body! She became the All Hallows church organist in 1942 and continued playing for the next 60 years. She married Cyril, who came from Kent, in 1942. Her daughter Nora was born in 1945 and went to school in Modbury and Ivybridge.

Cyril worked at the Devonport Shipyard. He passed away in1952, having been ill for the previous three years from emphysema, probably from his time in the war.

Alice then had to find work, and looked after various people in the village. Nora decided to move to Kent because her auntie and uncle lived there and she couldn't find a job locally. She learnt hair dressing and met and married Chris. Alice's father died in 1968 and her mum in 1981 aged 92.

She was well known and entertained the village many times with her monologues, including one of her memorable tips to London. When she finally retired from playing the organ at All Hallows she moved to Kent staying with Nora and Chris in Bethersden. She subsequently moved to a residential care home in

St Michaels, Kent. On July 15th 2008 she was invited to Buckingham Palace, which she thoroughly enjoyed. Another great pleasure was when she received the card from the Queen on her 100th Birthday in 2015.

She became ill just before Christmas and was taken to hospital on Christmas Day and died of pneumonia on the morning of 29th December 2017.

As you read this I'll be trekking in the **Himalayas** challenging myself to reach **Annapurna Base Camp** 4,200 metres high in the mountains. As some of you will know for over a decade I've wanted to reach this camp where you can look up to 5 of the highest peaks on Earth. In January, temperatures are at their lowest, oxygen gets more and more limited past 2,000 metres and there may be up to half a metre of snow, that makes for a deep footfall every step of the way. I'm scared of the wobbly wooden bridges over the deep gorges but if I do not do this now while I'm still healthy, I'll never make it.



I am delighted to include this (edited) article that was recently published in the Gazette. Living close by to the Capps family I can report that it is a rare occasion for you to see Noah with dry hair! I'm sure everyone will join me in wishing Noah success in 2018 and the years ahead. He is clearly a very talented young surfer.

"15-year-old Kingsbridge Community College student Noah Capps, has concluded a fantastic year by topping the Under 16 UK Pro Tour rankings. Still a year younger than most of his competitors, Noah sealed the title at the last tour event in Newquay, Cornwall and was presented with the coveted trophy at the award evening. In a year that has seen Noah compete all over the country and in Morocco, Spain and Scotland, he has finished as English National Champion, Surfaced Pro Champion, Jesus Surf Classic Champion and Thurso Surf Festival Champion.

Noah also represented England in Miyazaki in Japan for the World Surfing Championships in September; an amazing opportunity to gain experience on the World Stage. Despite surfing in the Under 18 division he still progressed through two rounds against much older opposition. Noah is managing to balance his college work around his busy schedule of surfing, travelling and training and is keen to keep this up. Head of PE at Kingsbridge Helen Tully commented "Noah has done incredibly well to have gained representative honours at such a young age. The experience he is gaining on the world stage is truly remarkable and we wish him every success as he continues to better his performance and carve a career in the sport he lives and breathes."

Noah is off to Fuerteventura at Christmas to train and film, then Portugal in February and again in April for the first Pro Junior on the World Tour in Europe. Noah is proud to be supported by Protest Sportswear, Luke Young Surfboards, Trioceansurf and Ocean and Earth. He also regularly trains with Martin Connolly at Discoverysurf."





We hope you have all had a great festive season and a wonderful start to the New Year.

Throughout January we will be continuing our work on footpath improvements, scrub cutting and tree works. Bigbury parish council and footpath warden approached us earlier in the year to ask for easier access to the beach along Clematon Hill path as people are finding the steep steps difficult to use. We have been successful in securing funding from our partners at the South West Coast Path to create a small switchback path to replace the steps by the beach and allow easier access.

We will also be improving the path through the meadow leading down to Wembury beach by levelling it out with the use of a mini digger making it easier to walk. We plan to do this in late January or February when we hopefully will have a dry spell of weather.

The Pay and Scan car park ticket machines at Wembury, South Milton and Bolberry are now operational. The National Trust is a charity and does not receive direct funds from the government and so we rely on Memberships and car parking charges to fund our work. These machines only accept coins for payment but more importantly they scan membership cards and provide a free ticket. For every member card scanned our area will receive £1 from central National Trust which is vital funds for our conservation and improvement works across the stunning South Devon coast. With 60-70% of our visitors coming to our sites in South Devon already members (which is fantastic) these funds are provided in order to offset the impact of member visits such as increased wear and tear of footpaths, car park areas and facilities.

The community orchard at Ringmore will be having some fencing and tree guard works completed shortly so that we will be able to graze sheep in the orchard to reduce the need for grass cutting in the summer months. A gate will be installed so that access to the orchard will not be impeded. We will also be looking to plant a couple more heritage variety trees and cut back some of the branches from nearby trees which are reducing the light into the orchard.


