

Fuel Update - Steve Rush, Senior Pilot - Devon Air Ambulance

For those that drive, you will be aware of the constant need to keep your vehicle topped up with fuel. Even electric cars need fuel in the form of stored electricity in a battery, topped up (slowly) via some form of power source.

Our helicopters are just the same. We cannot yet operate using electric power. There are not yet electric motors with enough power at a usable size and weight to generate the amount of torque needed to power a helicopter of the size we require. Indeed, even conventional internal combustion engines do not provide the power to weight ratio we require. That comes from gas turbine technology – jet engines.



There is, however, one significant issue with jet turbines, which is why they have never caught on as a power source for cars. They are very thirsty. To put this thirst into perspective, let me compare it to the most economical small car in 2018 (the Suzuki Celerio, according to the AA). The Suzuki Celerio has a 'real' fuel economy of 61.9mpg. EC135 burns approximately 250 litres of fuel an hour (as a rough average, weather conditions and weight of the aircraft affect this). If we consider an average ground speed of 120 knots, the EC135 can cover 120 nautical miles in 1 hour. That equates to 138 mph and this gives the EC135 a fuel consumption of approximately 2.5mpg.

Our fuel issues are further exacerbated by the relative lack of 'petrol stations'. According to the RAC, the average distance between petrol (and/or diesel) filling stations in the UK is just 1 mile. Even electric charging points for cars are, on average, no more that 47 miles apart (according to the Department for Transport).

For the Air Ambulance, however, our available filling stations are much fewer and further between. We can take fuel at both airbases, most commercial airports, and from our bowser at Derriford Hospital. We have recently concluded arrangements to take fuel from the Western Power Distribution airbase at Bristol.

There are also various fuel opportunities at other operator's airbases, such as NPAS and the other Air Ambulances, but these are often restricted and rely on the crew being at the base at the time we need fuel. Unlike your family car, we cannot simply fill up. Despite the helicopter having a fuel capacity of 710 liters (our friend the Suzuki Celerio has a fuel tank capacity of 35 litres); the operating weight of the aircraft limits the amount of fuel we can carry. The helicopter is limited by a maximum take off weight. Weather conditions affect the performance of the helicopter, which in turn affect the amount of weight it can lift, and thus affect the weight of fuel we can carry. Generally, the aircraft operate with approximately 450 to 500 litres of fuel in the tanks.

So spare a thought for the furrowed brows of the pilots as they spend their shift constantly calculating maximum take off weight, fuel burn, endurance and where the next fuel source could be!

We have welcomed Jess Tatton-Brown as Area Ranger to the Team, to temporarily replace Lorna Sherriff who has moved onward and upward on a secondment into the role of Visitor Experience Manager for South and East Devon National Trust. Jess is delighted to return to the team after 2 years away at Plymbridge Woods.

Single use plastics and marine rubbish are very much still in the forefront of everybody's mind since we all watched Blue Planet 2 last year. Whilst every effort is being made by governments and businesses to reduce the use of plastics, there is still hundreds of thousands of tonnes of plastic entering the marine environment. The storms at this time of year wash up lots of rubbish giving us an excellent opportunity to remove plastic from the sea. Thank you to everyone who collects litter from the beach each time you visit. This commitment to reducing the amount of rubbish in our seas is invaluable, and hugely appreciated by our ranger team. If you have couple of hours spare and would like to help please come along to our annual beach clean.

24/19 NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN (NP)

(by e-mail from RB)

The Steering Group did not meet in early February. However a meeting is planned for Tuesday 26th February to continue the work coming from the answers to the parish questionnaire.

Bigbury steering group has published its Neighbourhood Plan for initial consultation with their parish. The full report can be viewed on the Bigbury Parish website. Bigbury is at the stage that Ringmore was at approximately 18 months ago.

Bigbury has a much bigger population than Ringmore Parish and their centres are more divided by distance. However there are several things which are of interest and RNPSG can learn from the presentation. They are fortunate to have a professional town planner as a resident and heading up their NP Steering Group.

Their report covers many aspects of life in Bigbury but in summary they plan to build 13 houses on a plot of land gifted by a local landowner which is situated behind the shop in St Ann's Chapel. Eight of these houses will be "affordable", two more will be for the landowners use and a further three will be free-market dwellings but restricted to local people. The Bigbury definition of local is born, raised or resident in Bigbury Parish or showing an equally strong connection to Bigbury Parish. (e.g. a main relative lives there)

This 13 house build is in addition to the 12 new houses which have 'beaten the clock' to get planning permission on both sides of the main road in St Ann's Chapel. Four of these are currently under construction. None of these 12 houses are "affordable".

25/19 DEFIBRILLATORS

The joint application with Bigbury PC to the SHDC Communities Together fund has been successful and it was agreed to instruct Bigbury to order the two defibrillators on behalf of Ringmore.

26/19 ENVIRONMENTAL MATTERS

A date needed to be set for the October skip. There would be no skip at Easter.

27/19 PARISH PATHS PARTNERSHIP

JR reported that the work on Smugglers Lane should be finished before the end of February.

28/19 DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

RG had nothing to report on behalf of SHDC

29/19 **COUNTY COUNCILLOR**

RG reported that the government had raised the cap on increases to council tax above which a referendum needed to be held. Thus it was likely that for 2019-20 the tax would rise by 4%. It was noted that after 2019-20 there would be no grants from central government to local authorities.

RG gave an update on the economic situation in the County and noted that there was a significant shortage of skilled workers.

MAY ELECTIONS AND CLERK 30/19

The Clerk advised that all councillors would need to stand for re-election in May. SHDC would issue a timetable in due course and manage the election process. Ringmore PC is established for seven councillors. At present there is one vacancy. If seven or fewer than seven nominations are received in May it will not be necessary to proceed to an election and all those nominated would become councillors.

The Clerk gave notice that he intended to resign in May and thus the PC would need to find a replacement. However the Clerk advised that he would remain in post until an appointment could be made.



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
