

MOTHERING SUNDAY

The last Sunday in March, the 4th Sunday of Lent, is Mothering Sunday, when children of all ages give their mothers cards, flowers, or gifts to express their love and appreciation. The practice of giving flowers may have originated in Victorian times when girls and boys worked as maids and servants in the Manor house or other large houses often a distance from home. They were only allowed one day to visit their family each year which was usually on Mothering Sunday. As they walked home they would gather a posy of flowers from the hedgerows to give to their Mums to show them how much they loved them. Their mothers would have been overjoyed to see them again, after so long.

Motherhood, like the rest of human life, has its paradoxical side, its joys and its sorrows, its problems and its achievements. We see this reflected in the life of Mary, the young woman who had been chosen by God to bear his son Jesus. We can guess that as Mary responded to God's call, little did she realise what the future would hold for both of them. Never in her worst nightmares could she have imagined that thirty years later she would be standing beside a Roman cross watching her son gasp away his life in agony, dying like a criminal for a crime he didn't commit. No other mother has had the responsibility of the care of the Saviour of the world thrust upon her, but each mother in her own way has the privilege of nurturing a child who in some way could have the potential to influence the world around him or her. Parenthood has never been easy but in this day and age there are even more pressures on both parents and children, so it seems appropriate to have a special day to give thanks for mothers and the love, care and understanding they have shown us.

On Mothering Sunday we also think about the church which from its earliest days has been known as Mother Church. In the Middle Ages especially, people thought of the church almost literally as a mother caring for her children, for it was the place that offered spiritual and physical comfort as well as being the place of art and culture, and of healing and caring for the sick. Today the church is still Mother Church, caring for the spiritual needs of her children, and like a mother she is here waiting for her children who have flown the nest to come back home, and to welcome in those who have had no experience of such a home.

If a friend collapses whilst out walking the dog or someone chokes when having a meal, would you know what to do? And do you know how to use a defibrillator?

Nigel Toms is the 'first responder' in Modbury and has offered to run a basic life support session for anyone in the community (adults and children over the age of twelve) to attend. This will be free of charge and will last around ninety minutes.

No previous first aid knowledge is required and it will be a fun and informative session with audio visual information and some 'hands on' experience using dummies if you want some new skills practice.





We will all now look at the banners with renewed interest and understanding. Drina was ably assisted and encouraged in her research and in the service by Rosemary Wilson.

Praying for Ringmore

During our January village service "meeting the role of the Church in Ringmore" was briefly discussed, a variety of views were expressed. Views ranged from "the service as a base for developing friendships" to "a group of people who should preach the gospel, heal the sick, and raise the dead". It was felt that Ringmore was incredibly fortunate to have a church where anyone can come during the day to pray, reflect, or just be quiet. We all felt that more could be done to develop relationships between the church and others in the village; in particular we should be going out to people rather than expecting them to come into the church.

A number of us have decided that during Lent we should pray a specific prayer for Ringmore every morning, in our own homes, so Rosemary Piercy has ordered copies of a booklet that neatly contains 40 prayers - one for each day of Lent. PARISH ROOM: THE EARLY YEARS

In 1907, the Manor of Ringmore was transferred to a syndicate who sold some land for £20 to enable the erection of a "Church Room" (subsequently called the "Ringmore Institute"). This was to be used as a reading room and for entertainment, worship, education and meetings. The Institute was opened in 1909 by Lady Mildmay, who had laid the foundation stone the previous year; music was provided by the Ringmore brass band. The first Trustees were chaired by the Rector, the Revd Preb Francis Hingeston Randolph, and included David Triggs, great-uncle of Margaret Lock, who lived at Sea View.

Parishioners paid 2/6d (12½p) to use the room; outsiders paid 7/6d. The subscription for a monthly social was 2d (6d for non-villagers), but there were problems over non-payment of subscriptions.

In October 1912, Alice Mason's father Ernest Farley was appointed treasurer, and the committee included a curator and a librarian. The Church Institute was closed during World War 1, re-opening in 1920. Two years later the management committee met members of the W.I. committee (although interestingly the W.I. was not formally constituted until 1924). The ladies objected to the conditions of use laid down by the management committee.

The building was extended in 1925 to provide a club room as a memorial to the men who had served in the World War. Activities of the Institute included dances, whist drives and socials, but there was increasing animosity between the W.I. and the management committee, the latter wanting higher charges and disapproving of the noise caused by later hours. Finally in July 1929 the W.I. terminated their tenancy and built their own Hall.

Thereafter, things went downhill, finance being a problem, and in February 1931 the men's club formally closed. But that was not the end, and the Parish Room, as the Institute was renamed, is still in active use and is being progressively refurbished for the enjoyment of future generations.





W.I. February meeting

"Please be upstanding to drink a toast to . . ." A sentence Nick Goodman has announced many times during the years he has been a professional toastmaster. He visited Ringmore W.I. this month, dressed is his striking red ceremonial uniform.



Being a toastmaster dates back to the 17th century. But why *toast*master? In those days, grapes were squeezed by people stamping on them with dirty bare feet to get the juice out – not very pleasant. Once the juice was put in a glass, a small piece of toast was added which acted as a sieve to collect the impurities. The red uniform also goes back a few hundred years. In the early days, the toastmaster wore a dark uniform which was similar to the dress of the guests. Until one day at a hunt ball the toastmaster came in a bright red tail coat, which meant that everyone could see him. And so the uniform was decided.

During his years as a toastmaster, Nick Goodman has done over 300 weddings and many dinner dances. He kept us amused with tales about things going wrong – like the bride who took the ferry from Portlemouth to Salcombe, arriving in a wedding dress decidedly on the damp side. Or the lady with long hair, who leant back over a table, and a candle decoration set fire to her hair (the fire was quickly put out by someone throwing a pint of beer over her head).

Members agreed that it was an excellent evening, and if anyone wants a toastmaster, we know who to ask.





Free fire safety check!

Some of you will recall a previous presentation by Devon and Somerset Fire organised for the benefit of the Parish.

Some, but not all, subsequently took advantage of a totally FREE and no obligation survey carried out by an experienced Fire Officer from Devon and Somerset Fire service.

I personally used this and cannot emphasis enough just how valuable this service is and with the added benefit of a very helpful and polite team and the supply of FREE yes FREE fire smoke detectors fitted and operational. The Fire service will also consider installing additional equipment FREE of charge for those hard of hearing or otherwise disabled or requiring special equipment.

Amazingly some people have not used this service with excuses that I have heard along the lines of 'I have the most modern up to date fire system installed and hence do not need this'. From the conversation held with the fire service this is not a very clever strategy with systems often falling below the required safety standards. Regardless what have you got to lose to have a professional check your fire safety. It is FREE and even the phone call to arrange this is without cost 0800 0502999.

For those of us whom sensibly took advantage of the previous survey -should you have any smoke alarms which have developed any faults the fire service are more than happy to return and replace these detectors yet again without charge.

For those of you whom have moved address or new to the area, including non-permanent residents, you would be well advised to ring the number shown to arrange your totally **FREE** home safety survey.

Safety in the home

Don't let yourself or your loved ones be the next victim of fire. Follow these simple steps and reduce the risk:

- 1 Fit a working smoke alarm
- 2 <u>Take care when cooking and never leave</u> <u>cooking food unattended</u>
- 3 Plan and practise your escape route
- 4 Make a bedtime check
- 5 Don't overload sockets
- 6 Put cigarettes right out
- 7 Use candles carefully
- 8 Have your chimney swept regularly

Devon and Somerset offer free Home Fire Safety Checks. The check takes no longer than five minutes after which you may be offered a home fire safety visit.

The visit takes less than 30 minutes, they provide advice and fit a free smoke detector if required.

You are important to the Fire service. If you would like a free home fire safety check please call 0800 05 02 999.

Rodgers and Hammerstein's memorable tunes make OKLAHOMA! an eternally fresh and enjoyable musical classic. The opening scene, when cowboy Curly rides through cornfields singing "Oh What a Beautiful Mornin,'" sets the tone for this colorful, tuneful, and upbeat frontier movie.

"There's a bright golden haze on the meadow," sings Curly (Gordon MacRae) as Oklahoma! kicks off. He's right. There's also a brilliant blue sky filled with cotton-candy clouds and rolling farmland and pretty girls in petticoats.

And dazzling it is. One of the most fun and hummable of Rodgers and Hammerstein's many musicals, Oklahoma! took 12 years to make it from its innovative Broadway debut (it was the first musical in which every song related directly to the plot) to the big screen. The story of the romance between cowboy Curly and virginal Laurey (Shirley Jones in full soprano mode), it has plenty of peripheral characters, each of whom gets a song and dance along the way, from slutty Ado Annie (Gloria Grahame) ("I Caint Say No') and her boyfriend Will Parker (Gene Nelson) ("Everything's Up to Date in Kansas City") to the kind-hearted Aunt Eller (Charlotte Greenwood), on whose farm Laurey lives.

The other morning I went up the garden at about seven o'clock (pretty unusual for me) and came face to face with a fox, about 15 yards away. It was a magnificent specimen and apparently quite fearless of me. It didn't turn around and run; instead it just skirted round me and left the garden through the hedge and out on to the road. Other people have seen it, too and Ann Lambell thinks she may know why it was in such prime condition.

She thought she was putting food out for a stray cat she had seen, but once she saw this amazing fox lying down in the sun on her lawn, just a few feet from their window, she started to wonder who had really been taking the food. What a good job that his appearances in the village, not to mention Ann's banquets, have coincided with avian 'flu resulting in the chickens and ducks being kept inside. Has anyone managed to photograph this fox and is he even still around? I've seen quite a few foxes in my time, having lived either in villages or on a fairly remote farm for 40+ years, but I've never seen a better looking specimen than this.

COUNCILLOR VACANCY

A casual vacancy exists on the Parish Council and applications are invited from prospective councillors. If you would like to be considered please let the clerk know at the address below.

If you would like to know more about being a councillor please contact any of the councillors listed on the next page.

The small print concerning the process is set out below.

When a casual vacancy arises, the council must as soon as practicable, give public notice of the vacancy by posting the notice in some conspicuous place or places within the parish or community.

If within 14 days after public notice has been given, at least ten electors give written notice to the proper officer of South Hams District Council at Follaton House, Totnes, TQ9 5NE of a request for an election to fill the vacancy, then a byelection must be held except where a vacancy occurs within six months of the next ordinary elections.

If no by-election is called, the council must as soon as practicable after the 14 day period, fill the vacancy by co-option. If the vacancy falls within the six month period the council may but need not, fill the vacancy.

The council may co-opt whom it pleases to fill a vacancy, provided the person is qualified to be a councillor. The person co-opted must receive a majority of votes of those councillors present and voting at the meeting where the co-option takes place.

Cllr Sarah Hitchmough had tendered her resignation with immediate effect. The meeting thanked her for her contribution over the last six years.

The Clerk would prepare a notice of casual vacancy inviting those interested in becoming councillors to come forward.

16/17 DAAT NIGHT LANDING SITE

JR reported on the meeting between the National Trust, DAAT and Steve Comley. Subsequent to the meeting the NT had advised that it was not able to make the identified land available, largely for environmental reasons. The parish council would now actively seek to identify other sites in the parish and a draft letter was agreed to be sent to the owners of those sites.
