A mouth watering feast was provided by Sue Chambers and her band of helpers with contributions from all the churches that Neil has ministered to during his time with us.

David Scott the Modbury Town Crier opened the proceedings requesting Neil to say grace. Entertainment was provided initially by a rolling slide show highlighting various aspects of Neil's life over his 12 years with us followed by 15 members of the Ukelele band that Neil started a number of years ago. When we had all eaten of the abundant savoury and sweet delights, washed down with some fine wine, David called us to order again for Neil and Caroline to cut the celebration cake, which had been made by Jackie Tagent.

Boat Watch – Devon and Cornwall Police Alert

It is the time of year we typically see an increase in reported marine crime and I request you remain vigilant and report any suspicious, unusual activity or marine crimes which may occur.

I would like to take this opportunity to remind you of Project Kraken and request you keep us updated with any information which may be of use to us.

Project Kraken - a joint initiative now being delivered by the NCA, Border Force and police forces - aims to increase public reporting and strengthen the general maritime industry's response to the threats. We want you to report any unusual or suspicious behaviour in these and other maritime environments. No matter how trivial it may seem; if it looks out of the ordinary, we want to know about it.

Whether you work in the maritime industries, are a keen sailor, or are just walking along the coast, your local knowledge and your experience of the maritime world means you are well placed to spot anything unusual.

By working together we can help to prevent terrorists and organised criminals posing a threat to your neighbours, your pastimes, your businesses and your livelihoods.

They will exploit any opening they find.

How you can help

We want you to report any unusual or suspicious activity near the coastline and in maritime environments.

This could include, among others:

- Boats with names or identification numbers painted out, altered or erased.
- People or packages landed or disembarked from boats in unusual locations and transferred into waiting vehicles. Why are they suspicious? Note times, locations, descriptions of vessels, persons, including boat names, sail numbers, hull colours or other distinctive markings. If vehicles are seen note make, registration, colour and nationality.
- Boats moving late at night or early in the morning in suspicious circumstances, showing little or no navigational lighting or signalling to persons or vehicles ashore.
- Boats which may be overloaded, appear low in the water, contain people who do not appear to be able to handle the vessel or are inadequately dressed for the prevailing weather conditions.
- Boats containing people who appear to be engaged in unusual boat handling techniques such as recovering swimmers or divers from the water.
- Rigid inflatable boats moving at unusual times or seen in unusual locations and fitted with extra fuel tanks.
- Suspicious requests to buy or store large amounts of fuel, satellite navigational equipment, gas bottles, chemicals, uniforms or badges.
- Suspicious or unfamiliar persons seen in marinas or coastal areas carrying tools, paying attention to or taking photographs of vessels with high value items such as engines and electronic navigational equipment.
- Suspicious persons who ask questions about security procedures or who are observed filming/taking photographs/making notes or

drawing diagrams of: military/police/security facilities, vulnerable public areas such as bridges, tourist attractions, shopping, restaurant or passenger processing, embarkation/disembarkation routes at cruise ship, ferry terminals or docking facilities.

- Suspicious persons seen to abandon a vehicle onboard a ferry and walk ashore or who leave a vehicle in an unusual position in areas of high volume public or passenger access.
- Suspicious vessels observed entering maritime restricted areas or seen in close proximity to large cargo or passenger vessels whilst underway or at anchor.
- Suspicious persons seeking unusual instruction on the water such as diving, hiring powerboats, inflatable RHIBS or yachts. Who are they and where are they from? Obtain as much information as possible.
- Crew who show signs of nervousness or a lack of awareness of maritime protocols and customs.
- Vessels showing signs of unusual modification or minor damage.
- Increased activity at isolated coastal locations or at unusual times of the day.
- Any attempts to signal to vessels offshore or guide them into an unusual landfall.
- Strange patterns of payment, such as large amounts of cash.

What should you do?

If you see unusual or suspicious activity, report it to your local police on 101, or anonymously to <u>Crimestoppers</u> on 0800 555 111 and quote 'Project Kraken'.

Record as much information as you can - the

smallest detail could be significant. Do not take direct action against any individuals or groups. If it is an emergency or you require immediate Police attendance, call 999



Burglaries in area!

Recently, two residential burglaries occurred at Aveton Gifford whilst the owners were asleep upstairs. A car which was stolen from one of the burglaries has been recovered close by.

Scenes of Crimes Officers are currently investigating both properties and other detailed investigations are taking place.

We would like to stress that although this is a disturbing incident, it is also very very rare.

We are doing all we can to catch the offenders and will be conducting pro-active stop checks in the area to prevent and detect crimes.

Please ensure that your property is left secure at all times and ensure the locks on your doors and windows are adequate. Security lights, CCTV cameras and other crime prevention tools can be purchased from any good DIY retailer and are very reasonably priced.

Please ensure that you keep an eye on elderly or vulnerable neighbours too.

48/17 PARKDEAN

Steve Radford of Parkdean addressed the meeting to let councillors know about activity on the site. All were welcome to join in the Parkdean Fund Day and enter the soap box derby.

He explained that he had been talking to suppliers to try and persuade them to use smaller delivery vehicles. He invited any parishioner seeing an oversize HGV on the road to Challaborough to contact him with details. He apologized for the road closure which was due to the installation of fibre optic for broadband.

The public toilets at Challaborough had been kept open all winter because Parkdean had taken over the cleaning from SHDC. It was hoped to repeat this for winter 2017-18. Parkdean would be paying for a lifeguard service at Challaborough and new life saving equipment.

Parkdean was well aware of the inconvenience caused on the roads by moving caravans on and off site and it was hoped always to minimize the problem by arranging such movements for late evenings or early mornings.

Warning signs would be placed on the cliff and cliff path about venturing too close to the edge.

Parkdean offered to undertake any maintenance of parish facilities around the village.

On a question from a councillor Steve Radford explained that the number of homes on the site was below the license limit.

A parishioner asked if site users could be persuaded to adopt a one way system entering and leaving the site, that is, to enter the site from the Ringmore end and leave by turning left towards Bigbury. Steve Radford offered to take advice on this matter and if approved put signs at the exit to the site.

Michael Tagent would supply a new parish map for the shop notice-board.

49/17 OPEN SESSION –

Minutes as yet un-approved

- **49.1** Accuracy of minutes Michael Hammond complained that the November 2016 minutes of the parish council were inaccurate because they did not reflect a discussion about neighbourhood plans (NP). The Chair apologised and explained that councillors had attended a seminar about NP and had been deterred by the amount of work entailed which was felt at the time to be beyond the resources of the PC. See minute 61/17 below for more information about NP.
- **49.2 Transparency Code:** Michael Hammond complained that the PC was not complying with the Transparency Code (TC). The Clerk responded that the TC related primarily to the obligation of small parish councils to post certain defined information to a parish website. The Clerk was well aware of the obligation and had been in discussion with the Devon Association of Local Councils (DALC) and had attended a training course on this subject and a grant had been applied for to buy the necessary equipment and software. That application had been successful and the equipment had been ordered. Councillors still needed to decide on the choice of website designer (see minute 60/17 below). DALC was fully satisfied with Ringmore's progress in this matter and the recent audit had confirmed that the PC was

satisfactorily compliant with the TC at this stage.

Claudia Roden's Moroccan Orange cake

Ingredients

2 Oranges (medium sized)
6 Eggs
250g (8.8 oz) Ground almonds
250g (8.8 oz) Sugar
1 tsp Baking powder
1 Splodge of butter and sprinkling of flour for the cake tin
