Michael Wilkinson writes:

If you are a parent with small children in a playgroup or responsible for children up to 18 years, one of your extra duties could be to help your children or grandchildren with their homework. Your help in their understanding of the subject matter for conversation or comment, in sharing of knowledge, ideas, skills and information, makes it possible for them to change and grow and bring light and life into life.

A church person learns that Christ is to be found in both those who need and give help, just as sheep and goats are dependent on the care of the shepherd or goatherd. This is what the penitent thief found on the cross; the sinner found forgiveness and reassurance. Peter gave this testimony in his experience on Mount Hermon (or Mount Carmel). that he felt himself transformed, forgiven and resurrected from an ordinary follower of Christ, to be more like the risen Lord, a leader and a shepherd for his flock.

Gerard Manley Hopkins, nineteenth century monk and poet, found the Good Shepherd in the patron of his order of 'The Good Shepherd'. Hopkins came to believe that the risen Christ is prophet and a shepherd for His church at His death on the cross and in the resurrection. He wrote poetry to be relevant and helpful in people's lives. When he was ordained, his life was transformed by Christ and His glory. Hopkins found in his poetry that meaning of words and language of the greatest importance. In his poem, 'Pied Beauty', Gerard Manley Hopkins uses 'dappled things' to mean those that are not traditionally considered beautiful, defending diversity and variety

Glory be to God for dappled things— For skies of couple-colour as a brinded cow; For rose-moles all in stipple upon trout that swim; Fresh-firecoal chestnut-falls; finches' wings; Landscape plotted and pieced—fold, fallow, and plough; And all trades, their gear and tackle and trim.

All things counter, original, spare, strange; Whatever is fickle, freckled (who knows how?) With swift, slow; sweet, sour; adazzle, dim; He fathers-forth whose beauty is past change: Praise Him.

Kingsbridge Foodbank

Your continued support for the Foodbank has been considerable and I have been asked to express their thanks and gratitude – well done and hopefully we can keep up the good work No need to go hungry!, Working family- hours cut? Benefits delayed? Sudden illness- can't work? Affected by welfare cuts? The Foodbank is here to help and their purpose is to acquire and distribute emergency food supplies to people in crisis in and around Kingsbridge. They adopted a constitution in May 2012 and began to distribute food packages in September 2012. They are in partnership with various other local groups helping people in different ways that can issue vouchers for their clients to bring to the foodbank.

Their resources are local people donating food items that can be left in collecting bins located at Tesco's or Morrison's together with financial support from local bodies and many individuals. Within the village there is a collection bin in All Hallows church porch which is emptied on a Thursday or Friday each week. Volunteers headed by a group of elected trustees are responsible for running the foodbank. Other volunteers help in collecting and organising the food and running the distribution point. Their distribution point has recently moved to new premises at the Horizons building, at the top of Fore Street between the Museum and Tresillian and is open on Friday mornings from 10am to 12 noon. They are currently welcoming donation of all types of non-perishable items (except Baked Beans and Tea), toiletries such as Toothpaste, brushes and toilet rolls and all types of household cleaning materials. As many of Brian`s friends were unable to attend his funeral service at Plymouth the Family have given permission for his Eulogy to be included in the Ringmore Parish Newsletter

Brian McCabe 1929- 2017

Brian was born on Thursday 28th June 1929 in East Sheen, London to Jack and Evylyn McCabe. Jean, his sister, came along some time later.

He was educated at Kings College, Wimbledon. As a young lad he joined the 1st Mortlake Sea Scouts and so began his life-long love of the sea. He was a serving Sea Scout for three years before he joined the Royal Navy in January 1947, something he was proud of throughout his life. In the September of 1947 Brian was posted to the Whitesand Bay, a Bay Class anti aircraft frigate, serving in the Mediterranean area. It was this vessel that was selected to carry the Olympic torch from Corfu to the second stage of its journey to Bari, in Italy, before eventually arriving at Wembley for the first post war Olympics in the Summer of 1948, sometimes known as the Austerity Games. This touching of history, was something Brian would mention frequently. Brian remained a member of the Whitesand Bay Association throughout his life.

In time Brian and Anne married and together they had four children; James, Nicholas, Adam and Emma. Brian was working in Hazlemere as a salesman for Vent Axia and managed to get a transfer, when the family eventually moved down to settle in Modbury in Devon. He was always a snappy dresser and was able to sell very successfully, although at heart he had wanted to return to the sea. The marriage with Anne broke down in time and Brian was on the look out for help. He placed an advert in the Lady Magazine looking for a housekeeper and Jinny answered. After their marriage he became a stepfather to Teresa, Howard and Andrew. In time they moved closer to the coast, first settling in Ringmore and later in Easton, Bigbury.

Brian would support the children in their efforts and enthusiasms. In 1978 he and Adam completed the Lands End Trial in a Dellow, they were awarded a First Class Pass. He took Teresa and Emma to horse shows in which they were competing. He supported James and Nicholas in their Mirror Dinghy Races. Holidays were spent in Mousehole, Salcombe, with Cousins, Sennan Cove and Wales.

Without doubt Brian was a character and even in his advanced years remained great company. He loved a



drink, but was never keen to share! In earlier life he liked the pub, always stopping for lunch in a pub of he could, and enjoying real ales and cider. He collected a huge number of beer mats that he gifted to Adam. As he got older he enjoyed nothing better than sitting in his garden with a glass of Sherry, smoking his pipe, while feeding and watching the birds. Animals featured in Brian's life he was never without a dog and had a love of wildlife.

He was an outspoken man and could be quite political at times. Some of this would have been developed in his days as a Liberal Councillor in Hazlemere, or Chairman of Modbury Parish Council. It was fair to say he shifted further right as he got older and became more politically incorrect. His car was notable for its Union Jack.

Brian had endless jobs; some paid, some voluntary and was a familiar figure in village life, at one time driving the local school bus. He was a member of the Royal British Legion and was the colour bearer at Remembrance Day Parades. He was often in the Modbury Pantomimes with Brian Forde. They created a slapstick double act that would come on between scenes, loosely based on Laurel and Hardy, mostly involving bowler hats and shaving foam, they were, not surprisingly, known as the 2 Brian's. He helped out at the local youth club, although maybe the focus was not so much on the development of young people. He was a steward at the Fun Run. He was an Auxiliary Coast Guard, based at Hope Cove, armed with his hat and binoculars he would sit looking out to sea. He helped with Fair Week, he might say he ran it. For a while he worked on the St Patrick, out of Plymouth, a trawler, a job he had always wanted to do. He drove for the Oyster Shack. He was a fiercely independent man and remained so until his death. Quite indomitable actually!

After Jinny's death he coped admirably, to be honest better than expected. He learned to use the washing machine and cooked a strange concoction which he called Pot Mess, largely made of mince and carrots, he survived mainly on cheese, biscuits and tomatoes and all his life he enjoyed a cup of stewed tea in the morning. However there is little doubt that Jinny's death left a massive hole in his life.

A good year for apples

Many of us with apple trees think that this has been a good year for apples. Practice apple-pressing sessions, trying out the new equipment obtained by the Parish Council, have gone very well, with no shortage of apples. So it all looks good for the Community Apple Pressing Weekend on 14th-15th October. But is a good year for apples necessarily a year for good apples?

As many of you may have seen at the Garden Party, there is no shortage of apples at Barnford this year, but I didn't get round to thinning them out earlier in the year and so some of them are very large in number but not in size. This was brought home to me after the mid-September gales when I picked up over 1400 wind-falls in just one week, 1100 of them from under just two trees. You might think that this would leave very few still hanging on the trees, but this photo shows how dense they still are in places, even with hardly a leaf still left on the tree. If I'd got out there and thinned them earlier in the year, they'd have been far larger and juicier, with many fewer to



pick up off the ground, but I'm telling myself that the blackbirds talked me out of it. They much prefer them on the ground.

In the spring we saw a couple of Wood Warblers, but didn't hear them singing, so I assume that they were migrating. Again today (26th Sept) I have seen another Wood Warbler, presumably heading south this time. Although it was hopping around the berries in the cotoneaster and honeysuckle, their diet is meant to consist mainly of insects and spiders (plenty of them!). Has anyone seen or heard them during the summer? Their habitat is high woodland with open space beneath the trees. Have you seen any unusual species of birds or animals this year?

September meeting

Roll up! Roll up! So Ringmore W.I. heard about the beginnings of the circus back in the 18th Century. Our speaker, Mike Rendell, gave a very

informative illustrated presentation of how Philip Astley, a former English Hussar, together with his horse Gibraltar, would entertain the public. He acquired a field and timber yard near Westminster Bridge, and set up a riding school where he taught horses to do tricks at his command. Starting as the British Riding School (showing what a showman Philip Astley was), the name was changed to "Astley's Amphitheatre". He learned quickly the importance of advertising, and it wasn't long before eight different acts made up the "circus". Admission was two shillings for a gallery seat and one shilling for the riding ground. Assisted by his son John, and despite the fact that fire more than once destroyed the amphitheatre, Philip Astley became so successful that it was said that his was the second most recognised face in the land (the King's being the first). He died of "gout in the stomach" in 1814 and although no building survives as a monument, the diameter of today's circus (42 feet) was laid down by Philip Astley. Indeed, he laid the foundations of the modern circus. Quite a character!





Nightime Landing Site update

As most of you are aware we have been in discussion with Devon Air Ambulance for some time regarding the above.

I am very pleased to confirm that a suitable site has now been agreed with a huge thank you from the Parish going to the Capps family.

Plans are underway to site the night time landing area in the field known as 'Westlands' which is situated to the right of the road as one approaches the village from St Ann's Chapel.

There are some ground works to be carried out and the lighting column, which will only be powered up in the event of an emergency, will run from a mains electric feed situated near the gate.

Once installed the 999 operator will be able to determine the seriousness of any emergency call and should the Devon Air Ambulance be required the operator will be able to switch on the lighting remotely allowing the pilot to fly directly to the pre-determined co-ordinates and land.

Ringmore Parish Council and Ringmore Residents Association are firmly supportive of the project.

Currently we only have an approximate target figure of £10,000 and we have commenced the fundraising. All monies collected will be paid directly into the Ringmore Parish Council account and Peter Javes, the clerk, has set up a separate leger for this project.

Anyone wishing to pay any monies directly to this cause can either do so by way of cheque payable to Ringmore Parish Council or by way of online transfer to their account Lloyds bank sort code 30-94-72 Account number 00549092. Please make sure that you indicate the purpose i.e Ringmore night time landing. If you wish to make an anonymous donation please either use one of the collection boxes around the village.

Fundraising has already commenced and I am very grateful on behalf of the Parish to say a big thank you to Phill Errett and others for the contribution of monies raised during the recent Pancake Day- a total of £306.92 has been handed over to this cause.

I would also like to say a big thank you on behalf of the Parish to Adrian and Judy Bull for the use of their garden and to all of the helpers with regards to the recent Garden Party. A total of £673.93 has been collected to the benefit of this cause. Thus far our fundraising has reached a total of £944.85.

I am pleased to advise that the WI has agreed to support the project and the committee has agreed to fundraise for this specific cause.

Tesco, Kingsbridge has agreed to provide their support and has offered us the opportunity to collect in their foyer entrance. I AM SEEKING A FEW VOLUNTEERS? 


Boxes need to be completed by **NOVEMBER 11th** please, and can be passed to Judy Bull or myself before then.

Armed robbery in Ivybridge

Can you help?

Witnesses are sought following a robbery at a McColl's shop on Costly

Street in Ivybridge around 10.15pm last night [Wednesday 20 September 2017].

Officers are investigating after reports that a store assistant was threatened with a knife and was made to open the till and give over a quantity of cash to the offender.

The offender is described as male, white, 6ft tall, and was wearing a blue coat with a hood covering his face.

Information can also be passed on anonymously to Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

Kingsbridge churches have again been targeted by thieves. Both St Edmunds and Dodbrooke have suffered seven thefts between them since June. Mostly this has been by forcing open the collection box in the wall and stealing loose change from within, although most recently a pair of candlesticks has been taken from Dodbrooke. At this stage we are not yet aware of similar problems at other denominations in Kingsbridge. Police are working closely with the vicar, Revd Jackie Taylor, and the Churchwardens at both churches. In response to these thefts, church property is now securely marked with DNA products, rendering every item traceable and increasing the risk of the thief being caught. Anyone visiting Kingsbridge churches is asked to report any suspicious activity seen on101@devonandcornwall.pnn.police.uk


On Friday 15th Sept Kingsbridge Police received reports of two suspicious males trying to obtain money from 4 separate Kingsbridge businesses. 'Ringing the Changes' is the term given to the practice of criminals going into shops and asking to change large amounts of cash, often from one denomination to another. Then after several changes of mind they try to walk out of the shop with the money given in change together with their original cash, effectively stealing from the business. This will often be achieved by choosing businesses with few staff, or which look busy with customers, and the criminals usually operate in pairs with one deploying distraction tactics to further confuse the member of staff.

The pair operating in Kingsbridge last week were described as being in their 20's or early 30's, white with dark hair, large build and possibly Eastern European accents. One had a black jumper and navy body warmer with badges on it, and the other a white and blue chequered shirt. Both had black baseball caps.

The best way to protect your business from this type of crime is to simply decline such requests for change. If someone wants to change large amounts of cash, they can be directed to the nearest bank, where the staff are trained to handle cash, and the customers are all on cctv. In Kingsbridge on Friday, 3 of the businesses did just that, and the criminals left empty handed.

Finally at this time I have offered to assist Challaborough, Bigbury, Bigbury on Sea and St Annes Chapel neither of whom currently have any resident Neighbourhood Watch member. I could do with contact from any resident whom may be interested. This is a totally voluntary position whereby you could perhaps assist and support your Community. It is not onerous at all.

127/17 OPEN SESSION

Marquee and 2016 Fete funds and garden party 2017

The Chair opened the meeting with an open session for all present to participate in a discussion about the disbursement of the proceeds of the 2016 fete (item 10 on the agenda). The Chair read to the meeting the letter from the new fete committee. The issue being that the 2016 fete committee had resolved to set aside some of the proceeds of that year's fete to buy a new marquee. The parish council had bought the marquee in order that the VAT could be recovered on the understanding that the net cost would be repaid from fete funds less the £300 grant given by SHDC. The new fete committee had overturned this decision. After a lengthy exchange of views the new committee agreed to stand by the 2016 committee decision and pay the net cost of £383.64

Subsequent to the meeting and following an exchange of emails between the Chair and the secretary of the 2017 fete committee it was agreed publishing the letter and the council's response would serve no useful purpose as the matter of paying the invoice had been agreed.

Ringmore Neighbourhood Plan

The steering group has been successful in acquiring government funding for the next six months of £2,716. Most of this money is budgeted for training, hiring professional guidance and for printing of The Questionnaire to parish residents, which will be distributed in January. The money is controlled by the Parish Council.

The steering group undertook its first public consultation exercise at the Garden Party on August Bank Holiday Monday. This was a partial success by introducing the subject and allowing residents to comment on a range of topics that might become relevant in the future. However we did not reach everyone, so it has been decided to repeat the exercise with the survey attached to this Newsletter. It is a requirement of the Neighbourhood Planning Process that the steering group consult with the parish as widely as possible and this survey is a way of reaching everyone in the parish. The survey is a search for ideas and is not a voting process. This survey will help the steering group to ensure that The Questionnaire is asking the correct questions. The Questionnaire will be one of the main pieces of evidence when writing The Policy.

A similar survey was undertaken in West Challaborough with over a 40% response.

We welcome Mike Campbell, who has recently joined the steering group but we are still looking for more members. Five members of the steering group will be attending an all day training session in Exeter on Wednesday 4th October and there are still a couple of places available for any new members. 




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


