From the Editor.....



TOWARDS A NEW DAWN

This year we remember the hundredth anniversary of the end of World War One. As communities gather in their churches and around the war memorials of their towns and villages they will remember the names of those who paid the ultimate sacrifice. On a day like Armistice Day we long for someone who has the authority, power and control to bring peace. We long for someone or organisation that can end all tears, death, mourning, crying and pain.

In the last century we have set up the League of Nations, the United Nations, The European Union, NATO and yet the peace we long for remains elusive.

In 1955 Winston Churchill in his last speech to the House of Commons said: The day may dawn when fair play, love for one's fellow-men, respect for justice and freedom, will enable tormented generations to march forth serene and triumphant from the hideous epoch in which we have to dwell. Meanwhile, never flinch, never weary, never despair."

The day has not dawned but on the 11th of November 2018 we will remember that in 1918 the guns did fall silent on the 11th hour on the 11th day of the 11th month. At that moment there was peace: a great trial passed, and there was a sense of hope for the future.

<u>Looking towards the future the Bible paints a picture of a new day when God</u> 'will wipe every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death or mourning or crying or pain, for the old order of things has passed away.'

At the end of the Great War there was just a glimpse of what that felt like, before the shadows closed in again. One day, Christians believe, this new day will come and the shadows will never close in again. On Sunday the 11th of November come and join us in church as we will remember the past and look to the future.

Is Ringmore Hirundine Heaven?

From our lofty and formerly colourful perch, we saw our first Swallow on 13th April and a single Swift on 21st April. It was only from the 8th May that more Swifts arrived in the village with 7 arriving on 17th May alone. From then on we have spent many happy hours watching their flypasts and dogfights in the sky. Whether they were all local Swifts we do not know but on 15 July we counted about 40 wheeling about! The last swift we saw departed on the 4th August.

Swallow numbers were always smaller than the Swifts but made up for it by staying longer and ultimately joining with House Martins for massed flybys of sixty or more. Big movements were seen in the South Hams generally when massing for migration and we saw over one hundred and fifty in the space of twenty minutes flying East on the 23rd September. Sadly the last swallow we saw was the following day, obviously trying to catch up! Sadly 'til next year then!

Ringmore Neighbourhood Plan

Devon Communities Together, our independent advisor has now clarified their report following the questionnaire circulated to the parish earlier this year and we await their final version.

The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group publish below DCT's executive findings under the themes of "Housing, Transport & Traffic, Community, Communication, Economy & Business, Employment and Open Space & Environment" and for those who would like further detail, we intend to publish the whole report during November on the Parish Council website Neighbourhood Plan section. www.ringmoreparishcouncil.giv.uk. The responses provided by parishioners will help guide the steering group in the creation of the policies that will underpin the Ringmore Neighbourhood Plan.

Executive Summary - Key Findings

The table overleaf summarises the key findings from the Ringmore Neighbourhood Plan households' survey. The key findings are listed alongside the question responses that provide the evidence to support the finding.

Statistics from the last national census (2011) stated that there are approximately 105 households in the parish representing a population of some 210 people, of these around 190 people are adults over 16 and are the most likely audience for participating in this method of consultation.

The Steering Group organised the delivery of the questionnaire survey to every household in the parish during May 2018. The format of the questionnaire was designed to allow up to five individuals in each household to submit their individual responses. Stamped addressed envelopes were provided to enable residents to return their completed forms directly to Devon Communities Together for analysis.

A total of 58 survey forms, representing 100 individuals responses were completed and returned to Devon Communities Together (DCT). If the age profile of survey respondents is compared to that of the national census we can see that the percentage of "working age" respondents closely reflects that of the census, whilst the percentage of respondents of over 65 is somewhat higher than that of the census.

The return rate achieved indicates that 55% of households and 53% of the adult population of the parish participated in the survey. This provides a good representative sample, and the Steering Group can be confident that they have captured the views of the community.

Housing

- A. 84% of respondents to this query (80 individuals) indicated that there should be restrictions imposed upon new build housing being available for second homes
- B. 78% of respondents to this query (75 individuals) indicated that they agree that any new housing should provide a minimum of two off-road parking places per unit.
- C. 96% of respondents to this query (93 individuals) indicated that they would support restrictions on roof heights for new developments and redevelopments.
- D. 74% of respondents to this question (70 individuals) indicated that they would support a development that included affordable housing for local people if a need were identified
- E. 88% of commentators on this issue (87 individuals) indicated that they agree that new housing should be of good traditional design suited to the locality

Transport and Traffic

F. 30% of participants in the survey indicated that they would support some road safety measures in the parish

Community

- G. 73% of commentators on this issue (38 people) indicated that facilities for teenagers in the parish are poor
- H. 70% of commentators on this issue (32 people) indicated that facilities for children under the age of 11 in the parish are poor
- I. 89% of commentators on this issue (33 people) indicated that facilities for parents with babies and toddlers in the parish are poor
- J. The public house "Journeys End" is used by 77% of survey participants

Communications

K. 64% of respondents to this issue (61 people) indicated that they would accept additional transmitting mast(s) in the parish to improve reception for all residents

Economy and Business

L. 89% of respondents to this issue (86 people) indicated that they would not support further development of caravan parks and camping sites in the parish

Employment

M. 74% of respondents to this issue (62 people) indicated that there is no need for new employment opportunities in the parish.

Open Space and Environment

- N. 98% of respondents to this question (97 people) indicated that the peace and rural location of Ringmore Parish including it's proximity to the sea is its most important asset
- O. 97% of respondents to this question (96 people) indicated that maintaining 'Dark Skies' in the parish is important to retain the character of the area at night
- P. 96% of respondents to this question (95 people) indicated that the conservation of heritage buildings in the parish is important
- Q. 94% of respondents to this question (93 people) indicated that maintaining the AONB in which the parish sits is important to the character of the area R. 92% of respondents to this question (91 people) indicated that the single lane access into the parish with passing places and Devon Banks as an important part of the character of the parish and should be conserved
- S. 70% of respondents to this question indicated that local roads should not be improved to meet more modern highway standards





Hi Everybody,

I have been asked to arrange another visit to the Devonport EfW (CHP) Facility by several people in Ringmore EfW stands for Energy from Waste so, we take all the municipal non-recyclable household waste from Plymouth, South Hams, Teignmouth and Torbay and thermally process it, thus releasing energy which we utilise to create high pressure/temp steam which then drives a turbine and generates electricity. We then recover as much heat energy as possible from the process making it very efficient.

We supply the whole of Devonport Royal Naval dockyard with electricity and we also supply them steam heating by utilising steam that has done useful work in the turbine which, makes the plant even more efficient. This is what CHP stands for, combined heat and power. The whole process is very clean, efficient and reduces waste to landfill by 97%

So, if you ever wonder what becomes of your waste now that it is not dumped in a big hole in the ground and you want to come and have a guided site visit please contact me at:






