HE KNOWS

All the people who had ever lived were assembled before God's throne. They were sullen, complaining and murmured "who does God think he is, anyway?" One of the groups was composed of Jews who had suffered in gas chambers and concentration camps: how could God know their suffering? Another group was slaves, people branded who had suffered indignities at the hands of cruel men. What could God know about their plight? There were long lines of refugees – people driven from their homes, sick, suffering, each with a complaint against God. What could he know of what human beings were forced to endure?

From each group a leader was chosen, and a commission appointed to draw up the case against the Almighty. Instead of God judging them, they began judging God. And the verdict was that God should be sentenced to live on earth as a human being with no safeguards to protect his divinity. Let him be born a Jew, and born poor. Let even the legitimacy of his birth be suspect. Give him hard work to do and poverty that he might know the pinch. Let him be rejected by his people; let him be betrayed by one of his friends. Let him be arrested on false charges, tried before a prejudiced jury and convicted by a cowardly judge. Let him be abandoned by his friends and see what it is to be terribly alone. Let him be tortured, and then let him die at the hands of his enemies.

As each group announced its sentence on God, roars of approval went up. When the last had finished, the raucous noise had become almost deafening. Everyone turned towards the throne. Suddenly, heaven was filled with shocked penitent silence. For where there had been a throne, now could be seen a cross.

God does indeed know, and by the death and resurrection of Jesus, brings salvation, restoration and the unbridled joy of heaven to all who believe. That's the message of Easter.

The talk by Mary and James St Aubyn was well attended. It was a most entertaining talk on the Living History of St Michael's Mount.

Mary started by explaining how they arrived on the Island after leaving Ringmore in 1994 and living at a farm house in Hayle. They were able a few months after arriving in 2003 to be involved in a large renovation project to improve the facilities and make the home their own.

Mary made us laugh by the small things, like how do you hang out your washing when the whole w orld can see it. How do you get the shopping up to the living quarters – via an underground tramway and electric winch system! How everything is controlled by the tides, weather and how the community worked together as they had witnessed in Ringmore, including the story an Island First Aider delivering a baby as the midwife's sat nav had taken her to the wrong place! The twice a year fire drill involving the whole community, that meant calling the Penzance Fire Brigade and getting hoses etc ready for them, whilst the fireman arrived forty five minutes later. Mary talked about the visit by Prince Charles in 2010 and a surprise visit by the Queen and Prince Phillip in 2013, for lunch, which included a tour of the Mount and a visit to the Church, with the organist playing, on the same organ, the music that was played for a visit by King Edward.

James followed on by going back to the birth of the Island 280 million years ago, evidence from the Bronze age and the connections over time with Phoenician trading, the Monks of Mont St Michel, surviving the Tsunami from the Great Lisbon Earthquake in 1755 and much, much more.

Their talk highlighted the long St Aubyn family connection and our thanks go to both of them for the talk and their work on the Mount, which will preserve the history for generations in the future to enjoy.

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March meeting: Stowford Paper Mill

尜 米 米 Every two weeks we put out our blue sacks full of paper. Have you ever 米 米 thought where it comes from, and considered all the different types of paper? At the March meeting of Ringmore W.I., Sheila Hancox from lvybridge gave an ****** * excellent presentation about Stowford Paper Mill, which was established in 1787 by a 米 Plymouth businessman, William Dunsterville. He sold the mill in 1796 to Francis Fincher, and 米 under his management the business grew. In 1837 the first paper-making machine was 米 installed, and the business flourished. Previously, all paper had been made by hand. The golden age of the mill was in the nineteenth century, when John Allen and his sons ran the mill * for over sixty years. Sheila brought with her samples of different types of paper, and explained $cup{k}$ how it was made. The mill made paper used for marriage certificates and other legal documents. During the 1920s, bank note paper was introduced to Stowford Mill, and this continued right up to the closure of the mill in 2013. The mill also produced watermarked ** paper, and Sheila showed us samples of stationery, including some for the Royal Family. The mill gave employment to a large number of people in Ivybridge, and it is a pity that this piece of lpha* local history had to close.

FREE CPR & Defibrillator Training

1100hrs on Saturday 21st April 2018 at the WI Hall, Ringmore.

Training provided by Nigel Toms the unpaid local volunteer Community First responder for South West Ambulance Service.

Restart a Heart Over 3,600 people are resuscitated by ambulance staff every year in the South West because they suffer a pre-hospital cardiac arrest. For every minute that passes once in cardiac arrest, a person loses a further 10% chance of survival, and with this dramatic loss in chance of survival, there is a need of a defibrillator every 4-5 minute walk.

Without doubt this availability would improve cardiac arrest survival rates throughout the South West. A defibrillator is a device used to give an electric shock to help restart a patient's heart when they are in cardiac arrest. If there were more public access defibrillators, more people could get a life-saving shock as quickly as possible, ahead of an ambulance, which would assist in giving them the best possible chance of survival.

When someone suffers a cardiac arrest, the heart stops and blood is no longer being pumped around their body. The longer they go without emergency life-support, the harder it is to restart their heart. This is where you and your community, organisation or business could make a difference.

Security Lights



Theft of Oil. A large quantity of oil has been reported as stolen from the oil tank situated at Orchard House in Ringmore.

The oil has been removed by unknown means and the dates currently not specific as there is no damage to the tank itself and the theft only discovered during a 'top up' delivery.

If anyone has any knowledge or happened to see anything unusual occurring at or around the property in the past few weeks please contact me or call the police on 101 quoting crime reference number CR/023001/18.

Needless to say be aware and make sure that you have someone keep an eye on your property (may not be just limited to oil theft of course) especially if you are away.

See below for Devon & Cornwall Police general advice.

Siting Your Oil Tank

The position of the tank can have a significant effect on how hard a target it is in the eyes of the thief. If the tank is close to the house, with one or more windows capable of giving a view of it, then the thief may consider the chances of being seen too high. If the tank is close to a road, path, drive or alleyway then it will be a far easier target. Hiding the tank behind the garage, shed or some other type of outbuilding is fairly commonplace, but it does give the thief the advantage.

Control Switches

Switches that control the flow of oil should be turned off and the electricity supply isolated when the tank is not in use.

Padlocks

A thief will usually come equipped with a limited range of tools to attack your tank so it's worth spending a little more on good quality locks. Close shackle padlocks are the best as they offer most resistance to the most popular of burglar tools; the bolt cropper! Remember that buying a padlock is like buying a car, the more you pay the better the quality and the longer it will last.

Oil Level Gauges

Remote electronic oil level gauges are now available which will set off an audible alarm if the oil level in the tank suddenly drops or falls below a quarter full. These gauges can be located in the kitchen or perhaps a utility room to warn of any potential problem. There are two or three different versions on the market at the moment and cost between £70 and £100. Get into the habit of regularly checking oil levels so that you will know if you have lost any. Security lights can have a very positive effect and make any property a much harder target for the thief. It's not always necessary to floodlight the area with high power beams, as a more subtle level of lighting may be all that is needed. Low energy 'dusk till dawn' lights positioned close to the tank should, in most cases, provide sufficient light to illuminate any suspicious activity.

Defensive Planting

Defensive planting is nature's way of helping to reduce crime. Thieves will not wish to force their way through or over a prickly hedge. The smallest trace of blood or shred of ripped clothing could help the police identify the offender. These shrubs can, if planted around your tank, provide an effective and decorative thief proof barrier. **Securing Your Oil Tank**

Following on from the defensive plant tactic, fences and walls can also make life difficult for the thief. A wooden or metal fence, trellis or wall can give significant protection to the tank, but it must be remembered that the oil tanker driver will need access to fill the tank! A metal or grill cage with a lockable access point across the top of this wall or fence can further improve security. The wall or fence should be as close to the tank and as high as possible. Of course a trellis could also be decorated with defensive planting. A product called 'Tank Guard' surrounds the existing storage tank with a metal enclosure. This sheet metal enclosure has lockable access doors to allow filling and maintenance and has internal anchorage points to fix it to the concrete base. A tank guard costs less than one tank full of oil and will last many years.

CCTV

The use of CCTV as crime prevention and a crime detection tool has grown massively in recent years. It could play a part in the protection of oil tanks, but before you spend lots of money on equipment make an assessment of your needs.

Additional Advice

OFTEC or the 'Oil Firing Technical Association for the petroleum industry' offers advice and guidance for those who use and store oil at their premises. There are certain rules and regulations that may apply to you and OFTEC will help clarify these for you. They can be reached at <u>www.oftec.org</u> or by calling 0845 6585 080. They also produce an 'easy guide to domestic oil storage'

Dear Editor

My Mum died 14 months ago from Dementia and our whole family were devastated by not only her death but the years before when the Dementia was creeping in. I was struck with how ill prepared we are as a society for coping with the increasing cases of Dementia - in it's variety of forms. I was also struck with how little our children were prepared for what was happening to Grandma.

I have lived in Ringmore for the last 8 years with my husband Gavin and our daughters Bethany and Kelly.

I'm also the Headteacher of The Grove School in Totnes- it's a primary school of nearly 300 children right in the centre of Totnes. We are going to become a 'Dementia-friendly School' by training one of our staff to be a Dementia Friendly Champion through the Alzheimer's society. We are also working with Totnes Caring and will run a programme through the school teaching the children how to help people with Dementia.

Because of all this I have challenged myself to run the Plymouth Half Marathon in May. If you know me you will see me out running with Pip (our Beagle) early in the mornings. Currently I'm running (plodding) about 4 miles but will have to work hard to get ready for 13 miles by May. Last time I attempted the half marathon was before children arrived and I did the last mile in an ambulance due to heat exhaustion so I have some daemons to deal with too!

I will be running for two causes - for the Alzhiemher society through this just-giving page:

I hope that I am not alone in thinking this and I also hope that I am not the only person who would like to do something positive about the issue.

Cleaning up fly tipped rubbish and litter costs us all because it costs the authorities who are already strapped for cash, a fortune. The money comes from your council tax. Currently it is estimated that it costs the country a whopping £1 Billion per annum to clean up litter and fly tipped waste. That's £660 per head, per year.

Our area has become exponentially worse in the 5 years that I have lived here. Even the farmers are at it with their black plastic wrapping blowing everywhere. We are drowning under a sea of discarded detritus. It makes my heart bleed looking at it all.

I have started a group called "The Ringmore Pickers" on the Litteraction.org.uk website and I hope to get a band of us together to conduct some litter picking events. This of course is not so easy these days with "Elf & Safety" and Insurance considerations, but, the web site has lots of hints, tips and links to get through the minefield of organising such an event.

In the beginning of March our new Land Outdoors and Nature Project officer Ken Neal started with our team. Ken is looking specifically at the Bolt Head to Bolt tail area near Salcombe to see how we could implement our new strategy to look at landscape scale change for the benefit of nature and the environment. I will keep you updated with how this project progresses.
